Birchdale Bridge Project Update

The contractor, RMP, re-mobilized on May 29 and the scheduled date of substantial project completion is July 19. The Town, engineer, contractor and Unital recently met on-site to determine the best way to move utility lines without a service outage. This needs to be done in order to accommodate the crane that will be used to set the concrete structures, as well as remove the cofferdam.

OHRV Enforcement

The Department has received a grant from New Hampshire Fish & Game to organize and carry out



OHRV enforcement details. This will prevent unauthorized use of trails, railways, power lines and forests in the town.

Drug Take Back Day

The Annual Drug Take Back Day in April was SUCCESSFUL. Members of the community took advantage of the Bow Police Drug Take Back Day and turned in 84.7 lbs of prescription medication in one day.

As a reminder, there is a large grey mailbox in the Safety Center Foyer, where you can place your unused medications at any time. Remember to always scratch out all of your personal information on your medication bottles before throwing them out to protect your identity. Do not flush medications down the toilet unless specifically told to do so. If no instructions are given, take the medication out of their original containers and mix them with an undesirable substance such as coffee grounds or kitty litter. Put them in a sealable container, and then throw them out in a trash bag. You can also contact your local pharmacist for questions about proper disposal.

Protect Our Town

Next meeting September 9, 2018 from 2:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Safety Center. Discussion is current Police issues going on in Town such as swatting, social media, gaming, accidents, fatalities, speeds, and defensive driving. We spoke about the Concord Regional Crimeline, using it for anonymous rewards and posting of metal signs around Town for awareness. Neighborhood Watches is coming soon you may see "door knockers" around your neighborhood asking you to join this group. We are attempting to Protect Our Town in all ways possible to include Fire and Emergency Management! Community Training

Members of the Department were invited and participated in a Civilian Active Shooter training sponsored by the USDA for Federal Employees. While the majority of incidents involve the use of firearms, the term "active shooter" also encompasses an individual armed with any other type of weapon (e.g., knife, explosives, vehicle). The "active" aspect of the event inherently implies that both law enforcement personnel and citizens still have the potential to affect the outcome of the event based upon their responses. As a result, the USDA Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Coordination (OHSEC), in collaboration with the USDA Security Council and USDA Executive Leadership, recently launched an Active Shooter Program. The intent of this department-wide initiative is to promote increased employee awareness and preparedness. According to the 911 Commission Report, "Training is the most fundamental element in preparing to survive a violent event."

New construction

The Planning Board approved a modification of the Coastal Forest Products site plan to add another fifty thousand square feet of warehouse space. The building will be the largest in Town with a total area of 250,000 sf; a permit was recently issued for the new construction.

The meeting had 47 participants in attendance; the largest number of participants that the organization had ever had. The majority of attendees are commercial realtors in New Hampshire, southern Maine and northern Massachusetts. Director Matt Taylor gave a brief overview of the new TIF District. Bow was the only town in attendance, and we were well received by the CIBOR members.

Both Director Taylor and Selectman Poulin have plans to attend future CIBOR meetings looking to promote commercial properties for sale, lease, or land available here in Bow.

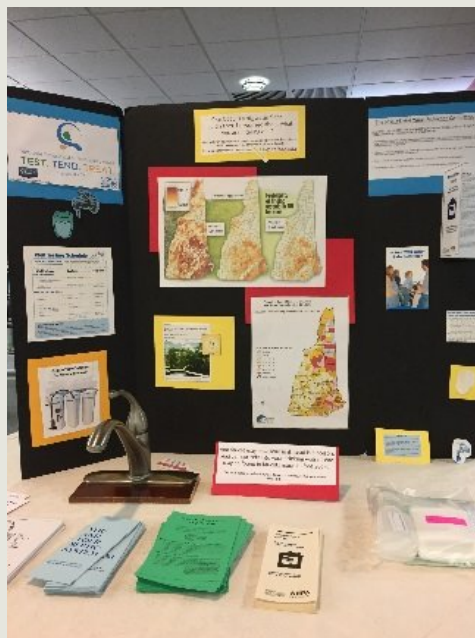
"Many hands make light work," noted Hilary Warner, Bow Open Spaces trail director. We had great groups of volunteers at both trail days and completed a lot of important work.
