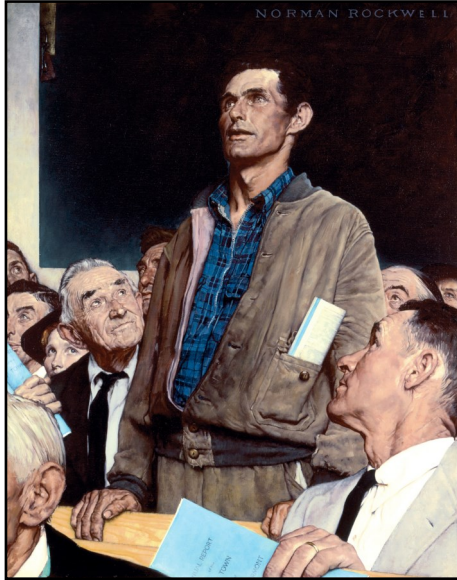

Welcome to the 2022 Town Meeting edition of the Town of Bow Bulletin.

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## Economic Development Activities

The Town has focused recently on two development proposals that could add millions of dollars to the Town's tax base. These include a mixed-use development near I89, Exit 1 and an industrial project off Dow Road. These projects and others being discussed or in the works require connection to public utilities.

The Town's water system has a capacity of 1,000,000 gpd, but an average daily use of 40,000 gpd. The Town has an allocated sewer capacity of 385,000 gpd at the Concord Wastewater Facility, but an average daily use of approximately 60,000 gpd. Currently just 4% of the water capacity and 16% of the sewer capacity are being used. There is no commercial property in Town that is currently served by both public water and sewer.

Advanced planning and changes approved at Annual Town Meetings helped to make these proposed developments possible:

- In 2016 the size of the Light Industrial Zone District on Dow Road was expanded.
- A mixed-use district allowing different uses and higher density in Bow Mills was approved in 2017.
- In 2018, Town Meeting approved the Bow Business Corridor Tax Increment Finance (TIF) District, which provided a funding mechanism for the waterline extension and road improvements in Bow Mills and Bow Junction.
- Another mixed-use zone district and TIF district were approved in 2019 for the southern part of town near the Hooksett town line.
- In 2020, the Board of Selectmen and the New Hampshire Department of Transportation agreed on a concept for the reconstruction of I89, Exit 1.
- Last year in 2021, a zoning change was approved that allowed higher density in existing commercial and industrial zone districts with public water and sewer.
- Talks are ongoing with both the City of Concord and the Town of Hooksett to discuss future sharing of utilities.
- Design for the extension of the Bow municipal water system is underway.



The Bow Police Department's K9 Roxy, has provided over 8 years of outstanding service to the Town of Bow and surrounding communities. Roxy will be retiring soon and the Bow Police Association will be fundraising to help offset the \$15,000 cost of purchasing a new K9 to fill Roxy's paws. A police K9 is a highly valued member of our police department, and we are reaching out to the public to help assist us in purchasing another K9 to serve the community.

The Bow Police Department would like to serve the community in the best possible way and a new police K9 is an essential member of our department. Having a K9 working in Bow greatly reduces the response time when the closest K9 available is with the State Police or another agency. K9 Roxy and Sgt. Matt Pratte have been a trusted and highly successful K9 team for the past 8 years. The department wishes to continue the high-quality service that K9 Roxy and Sgt Pratte have provided.

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# Winter and Spring Update from the Department of Public Works



## Winter Plowing and Road Treatment

The Public Works Department has been busy this winter. We have experienced a wide variety of winter events, including snow, freezing rain, sleet, plain rain, and mixed precipitation and we have seen warm weather, cold weather and freezing cold temperatures.

So far, we have had 19 days where it was necessary to plow and treat the Town's roads. Here is the breakdown: 1 day in late November, 6 days in December, 7 days in January, 3 days in February and 2 days so far in March. In addition to plowing, we used 4,014 yards of sand and salt.

## Sand and Salt Available

The Department offers Bow residents the opportunity to come to the DPW Building at 12 Robinson Road and fill a 5-gallon bucket of sand or the sand/salt mix. Bring your own shovel and bucket. Sand is available in big pile behind building and the sand/salt mix is available in a shed on the righthand side. No straight salt may be taken from the big salt shed next to the sand pile. This salt is only used for Bow roads. Come during daylight so you can see. It is available all winter.

## “Mud Season”

“Mud Season” will be coming soon and it typically lasts for about a month or two. Mud season is a period in late winter and early spring when dirt becomes muddy from melting snow and ice. Mud season occurs in places where the ground freezes in winter and thaws in spring. Dirt roads and paths become muddy because the deeply frozen ground thaws from the surface down as the air temperature warms above freezing. The frozen lower layers of ground prevent water from percolating into the soil, so the surface layers of soil become saturated with water and turn to mud.

## Frost Heaves

If a road is paved, and there is any crack in the surface, a water/sand/salt mixture will seep into the road base. The salt will cause this area to freeze at a lower temperature than the surrounding area, allowing more water to seep in. When the area eventually freezes, it heaves the pavement. The uneven surface causes more cracks, and the process continues.

## Road Posting

It is necessary every year to restrict the movement of vehicles on certain roads until the roads are dry and the likelihood of damage is reduced. Roads that are closed or restricted will have signs posted that will advise drivers before they enter the area. If a person violates the restriction, the law allows for both criminal penalties and civil liability to pay for restoration of the damaged area. The cost of restoration could be substantial.

New Hampshire law permits the Town to try to reduce these hardships either by granting an exemption to a particular user, or by imposing restrictions on use. For example, a delivery truck could be required to use the road prior to 10:00 a.m., when it is more likely that the surface is still frozen from the overnight drop in temperature, or deliveries could be based on a weather forecast when the temperatures are as low as possible. The Town will lift restrictions once the weather of “mud season” has passed.
